- ability and possibility in the present (can, can't)
- ability and possibility in the past (could, couldn't, was able to, wasn't able to)
- permission (Can I? could I? May I?)
- requests (will, would, can, could)
- wishes and preferences (want, would like, would prefer)
- offers to help and promises (can, could, will, shall, do you want? would you like)
- advice and warnings (should, shouldn't, shall, ought to, had better)
- necessity and obligation (must, mustn't, have to, don't have to, need, needn't, be supposed to, be expected, be bound, be sure/certain)
- deduction (must, can't, may, might, could, have to, should, must have, may have)
- regrets (should have done, ought to have done)
- wishes and hopes (may)
